The Gambling Act 2005 requires all licensing authorities to prepare and publish a statement of licensing principles that they propose to apply in exercising their functions under the Act. This Statement is to be reviewed three yearly.
f. What is the purpose of this policy, practice, service, or function? (Specify aims and objectives)	S349 of the Gambling Act 2005 requires Licensing Authorities to prepare and publish a statement of Licensing principles, reviewed three yearly, that they intend to apply in exercising their functions under the Act. The Statement forms the licensing authorities mandate for managing local gambling provision and sets out what the licensing authority will take into consideration in issuing relevant Licences and therefore its expectation in relation to premises within their area.

The Statement of Principles is to be considered by the Licensing Committee on the **24<sup>th</sup> September 2024** and the consultation will take place after this date for 4 weeks. The Act requires licensing to consult with the police for the authority’s area, one or more persons who appear to the authority to represent the interests of persons carrying on gambling businesses in the authority’s area and one or more persons who appear to the authority

to represent the interests of persons who are likely to be affected by the exercise of the authorities functions under the Act.

## 7. Summary

The proposed Statement of Principles, to be issued under the Gambling Act 2005, will outline how Derbyshire Dales District Council will implement the relevant provisions for the Licensing of premises within the District. This is in line with national Guidance issued by the Gambling Commission, which is designed to protect vulnerable groups from harm. With relevant enforcement and monitoring this will assist in the protection of harm and will be in line with the Council's Equality & Diversity Policy

The Statement of Principles is used as the basis for the licensing of premises within the local area covered by Derbyshire Dales District Council and compliance visits will be carried out where complaints are received, along with annual compliance visits. These visits will assist the Licensing section to gain information and potentially review Statement as and when required.

Members of the Council are provided with quarterly updates report on the work undertaken by departments of the Council, including that of Licensing. This will include the number of Premises Licences approved, complaints received and the risk-based enforcement inspections undertaken at Gambling Premises, which are the responsibility of the Council.
